... a house of cards.

The trouble with feelings is you can't scrub and hang them up to dry. They travel with you, sometimes haunting, the feeling you are ultimately alone.

Though we struggle to define subtle issues of life, it's more prudent to accept what we experience in day-to-day matters -- a handy tool, a practice that adds reality to how we feel about ourself.

Not easy as we interact with our social conventions: laws, friends and expectations. We all hide at some level from the experience of an active life, perhaps self-protection, a solitude of spirit.

www.spokanefriends.com spokanefriends@gmail.com Kovie Biakolo, who writes on this emerging issue, observes: "Loneliness is a dark place a state of mind: invisible surrounded by thousands of people". He continues: "Loneness is suffering alone," suggesting isolation as a defense from what we cannot accept.

Lately there has been much written on the topic, some that invites criticism. Needed is the medical necessity to diagnose the problems that create and sustain loneliness.

Following the teachings of the Living Christ, we are an open, loving, and affirming community. We believe that God's Light is inherent within all people. There are no exceptions.

One is better served in understanding the issues by perusing many extensive instructive essays –some challenge others. One thing is for sure, being alone and loneliness are different in scope.

There are a variety of contradictory opinions. Available writings pose group counseling, also meds that induce psychedelic journeys, among other offered treatments. "Loneliness is an awful paradox," observes Biakolo. He continues: "... a scar that never heals".

People who are lonely often crave human contact, but their mental condition makes it more difficult to form social connections. Experiences of loneliness can vary, but its overall effects can be profound, a public health challenge.

Given the growing concerns around the dangers of such, the U.S. Surgeon General Vivek Murthy recently offered an 82-page advisory on the issue, based on several studies.

Murthy's report found that the risk of premature death due to loneliness has dramatically increased. The report adds that the lack of social connection increases risk of anxiety, depression, stroke, heart disease and dementia.

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Loneliness is both intricate and imposing to each individual. It offers no single common cause to prevent and treat the potentially troubled mind. Researchers offer it's associated with social isolation, poor social skills, introversion, and depression. It inhibits your state-of-mind.

Loneliness is complex. It has profound impact on your overall health. This wide-ranging concern, a major health issue, has been linked to high blood pressure, depression, heart disease, stroke and more.

There are helpful agendas available. The online therapy programs include: Talkspace, Betterhelp, and Regain. For those seeking to blossom from this aberrant condition, consider the champions of social infrastructure as libraries, cultural events, friendship bonds and neighborhood organizations might lead the lonely from darkness into light.

Loneliness is a complicated subject. We live with feelings. Consider that the open doors and compassion of Spokane Friends is a good place to start.

We didn't manage to maintain a continuous Friends of Jesus presence at the Ramallah Friends Meeting and the Ramallah Friends School as I thought we would. But we are not the only ones who might see this through and ours is not the only time.

We did maintain faithful witness and service while we could. And churches around the pacific northwest were connected and involved. They sent me and others. Then we learned, prayed, served and loved as Friends of Jesus. I'm thankful. There are ongoing benefits we won't even know. So overall, like most of life, we keep our eyes on Jesus and trust him for the past, present, and future. And good work continues at Step's Jerusalem Center through Lana Thurston with Teaching Abroad.

I expect to make Newberg, Oregon, my home and put all my attention now to being rooted and grounded here. In some ways, my transition has been prolonged. That has advantages. Yet this last step feels big to me. I'm "hanging up my hat" as a traveling Friend with long sojourns in the Middle East. But I don't doubt the leading of the Good Shepherd. MONTHLY MEETING FOR BUSINESS MINUTES. 20 August 2023



The meeting was called to order with prayer by Clerk Laverne Biel. Twelve people were present.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

<u>Treasurers Report</u>: Jon Marconi reported. If the interest on the funds deposited with Everence should go down, we may want to change from a money market fund to something else that is more profitable. Recommendations will be made at the September Business Meeting.

<u>Elders Report</u>: Krista Marconi reported that there has been one applicant for the pastoral care position. They are preparing a hiring matrix so that all applicants can be screened by the same standards.

<u>Trustees Report</u>: Carpet for the children's rooms downstairs has purchased, delivered and is ready to install.

The appropriate portion of roof will cost \$10,000 to repair, but \$30,000 to replace. Replacement would also require an additional charge to maintain the contract. Repair is the best option, and it was indicated that they should be good for about 20 years. It is yet to be determined how best to pay for the repairs. The Meeting **approved proceeding with repair work**.

<u>Nominating Committee</u>: Sue Keehnen reported that the committee was unable to find anyone who would agree to accept a position either as Treasurer or as an Elder. At that time, Pam Emery volunteered to serve as an Elder, with Lois Kieffaber offering to serve as an Elder on a two-to-three month basis.

Discussion was held on outsourcing the Treasurer's work. Laverne will check a corporate option. Lois will contact Ken Bendixen for possible referrals.

The meeting was closed with prayer by the Clerk.

This Labor Day let's salute American corporations for keeping the Chinese gainfully employed.










CONGRATULATIONS PAUL AND EVELYN!
